

## **HAZARDOUS MATERIAL COMMUNICATION PROGRAM 1742**

(November 1991)

In order to provide a safe work environment and comply with CAL-OSHA regulations (CCR, Title 8, Section 5194), employees must be informed about the hazardous substances to which they may have been exposed. To help provide a safe work environment and meet CAL-OSHA requirements, unit managers should designate a person to be responsible for the management of the Hazardous Material Communication Program and require supervisors and other employees to follow the procedures and policies in this section.

## **HAZARDOUS MATERIALS--REFERENCES 1742.1**

In order to make decisions regarding the use of hazardous materials, supervisors should be familiar with the information contained in the following references from the Health and Safety Code Handbook by the U.S. Forest Service, and the California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 8:

- Transportation of Hazardous Materials (H&SCH, Chapter 9-4).
- Explosives Storage and Transport (H&SCH, Chapter 9-5; Title 8, Article 115).
- Flammable and Combustible Liquids (H&SCH, Chapter 9-6, Title 8, Group 20).
- Radiation (H&SCH, Chapter 9-12; Title 8, Group 14).
- Pesticides (H&SCH, Chapter 9-10, Title 8, Article 13, Section 3453).
