

CONSTRUCTION WITH OTHER LAWS

Denying an individual access to his/her own records requires reasons found in the Information Practices Act as well as other law. The California Public Records Act is not a basis for denying an individual access to his/her own records; the IPA supersedes the CPRA in such situations (CC Section 1798.70).

Existing rights of litigants to resist discovery as well as to discover information under litigation are protected under this section (CC Section 1798.71).

Nothing in this section shall be construed as to allow disclosure of any record containing personal information other than to the subject of records in violation of any other law (CC Section 1798.72).

An individual may have a cause of action under right of privacy guarantees even though no violation of this act occurred (CC Section 1798.73).
